Parish Precept for 2011/12

The Parish Council agreed a Parish Precept of two hundred and forty six thousand, three hundred and thirty one pounds at their December Meeting. This represents an increase of £1.14 per annum or 2.1 pence per week on the current Parish Precept at Band D of £45.63.

The 2.48% increase was made in the light of advice from the leader of Surrey County Council which stated that all local authorities were expecting challenging settlements from the government, and that there would be a need to devolve delivery of services, where suitable. With all levels of government except town and parish councils, being subject to capping, it is this sector that is most likely to pick up additional services. Town and Parish Councils are able to tap into local knowledge and provide services for the needs of their communities, often more effectively than Borough or County Councils.

Localism and working together towards a 'Big Society' is the message being spread from government. Cranleigh has been working collaboratively with other agencies for a number of years now as part of our vision statement and business plan, and we will continue to work in this way to gain the best for our community.

The budget for 2011/12 includes £5,000 in preparation for the possibility of having to act quickly to take on responsibility for services currently provided by other authorities. We are aware that in some cases the services may be cut dramatically or even lost if the Parish Council does not step in.

We are currently in negotiation with Waverley to take over the public conveniences on Village Way and on the Common, and we are discussing other services that could be improved by providing them locally. The 2011/12 budget includes setting aside money to replace or improve existing assets owned by the Parish Council, the provision of hard standing for parking at Elmbridge allotments and money to upgrade some litter bins in the High Street.

We have worked hard to improve standards within our business and achieved a great deal over the last five years. We were one of the first parishes in Surrey to attain Quality Parish Status and the Power of Wellbeing, both of which established Cranleigh as a forward thinking, professional organisation. We have promoted strong working partnerships with the users of our facilities and other organisations within Cranleigh to gain the best we possibly can for our residents. We have implemented the use of new technology when

possible, installing a CCTV system at Snoxhall and the Village Hall which has enabled us to work proactively with the Police and been a deterrent to 'would be' vandals. We have championed the production of an emergency plan and worked with the Borough Council and other organisations to achieve an upgraded and extended Play Park with minimal impact on the local taxpayers. Snoxhall pavilion was upgraded to provide improved accessibility for users and welfare facilities for our staff. The Village Hall has been decorated inside and out, had a new floor in the Main Hall, new chairs and improvements to the lighting.

Whilst we have provided improved services and achieved a great deal on behalf of our residents over the last eight years, the cost at Band D to council tax payers has increased by only just over 1% per year

Elections for Parish Councillors

The next election is due to be held on **Thursday 05 May 2011**.

Nominations from candidates will be invited in **March 2011**.

Below are just a few keys points about Cranleigh Parish Council: What is Cranleigh Parish Council?

•It is a local authority and acts corporately as a statutory body. Cranleigh Parish Council comprises 12 Councillors. The Chairman of the Council is elected annually from among the Councillors.

What can your Parish Council do?

- •Act within the scope of the statutory functions laid down by Parliament.
- •Own land and other assets. In Cranleigh, the Council owns Snoxhall Recreation Ground including the sports pavilion, tennis courts and Play Park, the Village Hall and Dewlands Lane Cemetery. We also own the Beryl Harvey Allotments off Knowle Lane and the Elmbridge Road Allotments. We have responsibility for some of the flowerbeds in the High Street.
- •Employ staff. We employ a full time Parish Clerk and Assistant Clerk, a part time Administration Clerk, a Grounds Manager, a Groundsman, Sexton, Caretaker at the Village Hall and a General Works Assistant.
- •Appoint an officer to manage its financial affairs. This is usually the Parish Clerk.
- •Raise a tax through precept and set a budget for income and expenditure. The Parish Council element of your Council Tax will be £46.77 for a Band D property in 2011/12.

How does the Council make its decisions?

•Decision making is done through the full Council, but it can delegate powers to Committees. Individual Councillors cannot make decisions. Cranleigh Parish Council has a Planning Committee, Finance Committee, Village Hall Committee and Cemetery Committee. In some cases working parties or subcommittees are appointed to bring back information to the full Council to enable decisions to be made. The full Council meets every month except August. The Planning Committee meets every three weeks and the other Committees meet approximately every three months.

Christmas in Cranleigh

Congratulations to Emma Dawson, the Cranleigh Co-ordinator, Roger Coupe, the President of the Chamber of Commerce and all of those who were involved in making this year's run up to Christmas in Cranleigh such an enjoyable event.

Community events such as the Christmas light switch on, Spring into Cranleigh and summer events in Stocklund Square and Fountain Square are organised by the Cranleigh Initiative. The Cranleigh Initiative is a group of representatives from the local community and local businesses who work alongside the Parish Council and Waverley Borough Council to provide opportunities for Cranleigh. The events are intended to bring people together to enjoy the variety of facilities that Cranleigh can offer.

This year the Parish Council agreed to apply for a premises licence to enable street entertainment in certain areas of Cranleigh for community events such as those leading up to Christmas. The licence will cover the pavements along the length of the High Street, Stocklund Square, Fountain Square, Snoxhall Fields, the two car parks in Cranleigh and areas of the Common. The licence will cover live



dance, music, plays and entertainment of a similar nature, within restricted hours and for a maximum of 15 days a year.

Whilst this will mainly cover the events organised by the Cranleigh Initiative, there may be the opportunity for other organisations to benefit from the licence.

Land Exchange

We are delighted to have finally completed the land exchange with Cranleigh Village Hospital Trust, of the paddock field on Knowle Lane for land on the other side of Knowle Lane which is to provide new playing

fields. The grounds, which will be known as the Bruce McKenzie Memorial Field, will give Cranleigh

sportsmen, women and children much increased recreational facilities in the future, and will also include a full size football pitch. The smaller paddock field, which is south of the Downslink, will now provide the site for the new Cranleigh Hospital together with its increased health and care facilities.

Cranleigh Village Hall

Cranleigh Village Hall hosts many events that are popular with our local community. There is either a flea market or charity sale on most Thursdays during the year except when the Arts and Crafts Society have their spring and autumn exhibitions and during August when the Hall is closed.

The Hall is used for stage and choral productions and there are regular concerts and quizzes held throughout the year. In addition there is the opportunity to take part in line dancing classes and to attend blood donor sessions.

In addition, the Village Hall is an ideal venue for wedding receptions, private parties, meetings and exhibitions.

Parking at Snoxhall Fields



Car parking at Snoxhall Fields was discussed at a recent Council meeting following concerns regarding safety from cars to those using the recreation fields.

We decided to withdraw all parking permits at Snoxhall Car Park from 1st January 2011 and to introduce a long term management plan for the car park and to explore the possibility of working in partnership with Waverley Borough Council to make the area a pay and display facility.

The small car park at Snoxhall Fields is intended for those who use the recreation fields and the Play Park only. Those using the car park should do so safely and considerately.

Grants and Donations

The Parish Council has a small grants fund that can be allocated to capital projects which give a tangible and immediate benefit to the local community. Donations can be given up to the value of £100. Usually, funding can only be given under the powers bestowed on Parish Councils, but as Cranleigh has the Power of Well-being we can support projects as long as they give either economic, environmental or social well-being to members of the parish.

The Finance Committee awarded funding to seven organisations at their October meeting. Among these were Cranleigh Youth Club, who put forward a successful application for £250 towards a dishwasher. This useful piece of equipment will be especially appreciated by those using the Youth Café.

A sum of £450 was awarded to the Cranleigh Rotary and Chamber Map Fund towards a display board/notice board which will be sited on Parish Council land on Village Way.

St Joseph's Specialist School and College received £346 towards volunteer transport and Girlguiding Cranleigh Village District received £500 towards toilet refurbishment in the Guide Hall.

Spinning equipment for **Snoxhall Play Park**

We are very grateful to the Action for Cranleigh Play Park Association who have donated £1,560 to provide two 'spinning bowls' for the Play Park at Snoxhall.


The 'spinning bowls' which are for the 4 to 9 age range will be installed in the new year and will provide additional enjoyment to those who use the Park.
